Criteria 1.1 INTRODUCTION

We are presenting this SSR for the 1st cycle of accreditation when it almost became mandatory for every college be it as small as ours.

Our college Virangna Rani Awanti Bai Lodhi Govt.College of Arts & Commerce College Ramatola,Dist.Rajnandgaon (Chhattisgarh) was established in Aug 1989 by the Department of Higher Education, Govt.of Madhya Pradesh.This is an undergraduate college conducting Bachelor of Arts programme. It's affiliated to the Hemchand Yadav University Durg.

This is located in a 15 acre campus in the rural area catering mostly to Tribal and Other Backward class children.

The nearest rail head is Dongargarh 10 kms away. Dongargarh is the important railway station on the Mumbai-Kolkata trunk route. Trains are available to all the major cities of the country like Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata, Chennai, Hyderabad, Ahmedabad and other state capitals..

Its on the state highway connecting Dongargarh- Ramatola- Lal Bahadur Nagar-Chichola(20 kms stretch). Chichola is the meeting point of the state highway and National Highway 53(old NH-6). This Govt College Ramatola is flanked by the two bigger Govt. Colleges at Dongargarh(10kms away) and Lal Bahadur Nagar (4kms away). This sandwiched location is the biggest bottleneck in its student intake and general growth. Those who cannot get admission elsewhere can get admission here. The government did take initiative to close it down but the order was cancelled. Once again after some time another govt tried to close it down but restricted its order to closing the Commerce Faculty. This college is having the distinction of being the Single Faculty College in the State. Under the Arts faculty the subjects taught are Hindi, English, History, Economics and Sociology. The student intake never crossed 100 in its entire existence of thirty two years. The average strength of the college over the years is less than 50. The present strength of 140 is due to the online open exam due to the corona crisis management.

The present college building was built in 2007. The location of the college is scenic. It has two ponds in the campus. It is surrounded by the hills and forests nearby. The primary health centre is just 150 metres away.

The main endeavour of the college is to sustain itself catering to the economically, socially and educationally most disadvantaged students and get them into the mainstream of society through sustained learning and arousing in them the curiosity to understand and explore the social ,economic and the political realities of the country and the larger world. To instill in them the strength to better themselves to make the nation strong.

Our vision for our college for students, teachers, the non teaching staff and the college itself is small but significant. For the students it is to make them aware about the importance of knowledge in daily life and use it to improve themselves and their surroundings in a meaningful way. Curricular Aspects

Our college follows the curriculum set by our affiliating university Hemchand Yadav University Durg. The academic calendar is decided by the department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh. The academic component is taken care of by the HYU University. The college tries its best to implement the curriculum in the best interest of the students. The college has limited number of subjects under only one faculty. Under Arts Faculty five subjects are taught- History, Economics, Sociology, Hindi and English. The student is given option to choose any three subjects along with compulsory Hindi language and English language. Environmental science is compulsory in the first year of 3 year degree course. Teachers make the month wise teaching plan for the academic year. This is monitored by the Principal of the college. The students feedback is taken on the teaching learning methods for evaluating its outcome. The field trip is organized by the college to supplement their leanings.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Criteria 2

The college adheres to the teaching –learning evaluation. The college caters to the needs of the rural deprived

sections whose educational attainment is quite low. The syllabus of the university is followed in toto for the annual examination sake but its content is modified for simpler presentation to the students. It is toned down to the comprehension level of t he students. The class teacher engages in the discussions and use the internet based learning system to educate them. Google meet and Zoom platform is used for online class lectures during the lockdown period due to covid 19. College encourages the staff for various faculty development programmes. Those not having Ph.D degrees are encouraged to pursue the programme. The evaluation at the annual exam reveals that pass percentage of the students conforms to the average of university pass percentage. The college in its admission policy it follows the SC/ST/OBC reservation norms of the state government. The examination is conducted timely and the annual results declared on time. The internal examinations are held. Half yearly exam is conducted whose marks are added to the annual results declared by the university.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Criteria 3 Research, Innovation and Extension

Our college does not have the traditional infrastructure for research. The Post Graduate class is not held .Our library is devoid of the reference books. Library caters to the text book needs of the students alone.Despite the limitations during the last 5 years 2 teachers have been awarded the Ph.D degree. They have published some research papers in the local and national level journals. The college undertakes the social responsibility part quite seriously. Through youth red cross, voter awareness and green plantation drive the college meets the social responsibility. The medical health campaign regarding AIDS, health and sanitation is followed.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Criteria 4 Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has a building of its own which is maintained by the PWD. It has 4 class rooms, 1 office ,1 principal chamber, I staff room, I library, I kitchen, I girls common room. One small gymnasium. There is one computer for the office use and one for the students. Our college is quite poor in matters of fund. We don't get any RUSA fund. The paucity of fund affects it's all round development. The classroom has sufficient furniture. The library has 4961 books in stock. The college doesn't subscribe to any journal. The government of Chhattisgarh is going to take the decision of digitalizing the library soon as per the newspaper reports.

Student Support and Progression

Criteria 5

Student support and Progression;

Our college encourages the students to participate in the academic and non academic activities of the college for the complete personality development of the students. The outgoing students are advised on the higher studies and other job related exams. The student union are constituted every year as per the instructions and guidelines of the State Government of Chhattisgarh. The government provides the scholarship to the college students. They get scholarship under the Post Matric scholarship and BPL scholarship scheme. The students are given English language speaking training and communication skills, public speaking training. The hygiene and

sanitation principles are conveyed in simple biological form. For the physical fitness the sports facilities like Gym,Badminton,Table Tennis are made available to the students. The Youth Red Cross conducts programmes on the AIDS awareness and its prevention. .Students are actively involved in the greening of the campus. The students' social consciousness is raised through individual and collective interaction with the society. The moral obligation to give back to the society and contribute to its development is instilled in the students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Criteria 6

Governance, Leadership and Management.

This college is governed by the state government and its rules are followed. The Principal is appointed by the the government who is the administrative head of the institution. The teaching staff is also appointed by the state government through Chhattisgarh Public Service Commission. All the staff of the college have to follow all the rules of the state government in all service matters. The salary is disbursed through the Treasury of the Government. The principal adopts a participative system of management in decision making. He makes various committees for smooth functioning of the college. For the annual exam one Center superintendent is appointed to conduct the exam smoothly. The purchase committee follows the rules of the purchase and recommends the right firm for placing orders. The teaching staff is encouraged by the principal to attend conferences and seminars and to join the faculty development programmes.

The college endeavors to inculcate the punctuality among the staff and responsiveness to the students problems and the issues. The campus is made eco friendly through the plantation drive in and outside the campus. The sensitivity towards girls and ladies is taught. The third gender issues and the problems faced by them in the society is explained. The legal rights of women and the third gender is propagated and practiced. The human values of compassion ,tolerance and respect for other individuals and religion is taught. The college staff believes in interacting with each other on the personal level. They participate in the family functions like marriage or birthday celebrations. The teachers visit the students house to motivate the students and the parents and solve the issues faced by them. The college power consumption is quite low because of the judicious use and natural lighting. The rain water harvesting has been done . the use of plastic is banned. Uses of bicycles are encouraged. Inside campus has been adequately planted wirh flowers and fruit bearing trees. For Divyangs ramp has been made at the entrance of the college. The right way of using the washroom has made it stink free. A new value system is developed amongst the users that they themselves are responsible for using and keeping it clean. The college organizes various activities to promote the harmony amongst different linguistic, cultural and religious groups. The national and international days and events are celebrated.

1.1.1 The College follows the academic calendar prepared by the department of Higher Education, Govt. of Chhattisgarh and followed by the affiliating university Hemchand Yadav Vishwavidyalya Durg. An academic year starts in the month of July every year and ends in the month of June of the succeeding year.Due to the Covid situation in the country and our state since March 2020 the academic and exam schedule got disturbed and offlilne exam got replaced by online or home exam. It had effect on teaching and on the exam results. Almost all the appearing students in the exam passed and moved to the next level. Academic calendar of the session starts with admission process of UG classes for which advertisements through University online channels and transparency in the admission process is followed. Date of issue of admission forms and their submission is decided, declared and notified through newspapers, Colleges' website and also display. Its put on the notice boards of the college too. Admissions to UG classes are provided on the basis of merit and Government's reservation policy for SC/ST/OBC students. Class wise teaching time table is displayed on the notice board of the College. Month wise teaching plan is prepared for each Course of the UG classes. Classes starts from first week of July. No guest lectures are appointed as we have all the faculty positions filled up. Orientation programs are organized for the new boys and girls to acquaint them with the college, its rules and regulations. The freshers are made acquainted with the College and University norms and regulations. The main curriculum and awareness about extra-curricular and co-curricular activities is also conveyed to the students. The conduction of internal assessment is a regular process and a part of curriculum and the marks obtained are added to the final scores in annual exams. Model exams for the UG classes are also conducted in the month of January for preparing the students for the annual exams. Cultural festival is celebrated in the month of December/January. The active participation of the students in the cultural activities is encouraged to make them aware about their traditional and cultural values.

Every year the new academic session starts in the month of July and ends in the annual exam which starts in mid March-April. The total teaching days is usually around 180 days. The month of May and June is for evaluation of answer books and short summer break of 15 days.

The admission dates are announced keeping in the mind the class 12 th result . Our affiliating university HYU Durg has centralized the online applications for admissions in various colleges. The college downloads the application forms of their college applicants and prepares the merit list. It follows the State Government reservation policy for SC/ST/ OBC students

The admission notice is displayed on the website and on the college notice board. The information is also disseminated through WhatsApp class groups.

At the beginning of the session Time Table is displayed on the college notice board. The class timing is from 10.30 to 5.30 p.m. on all six working days

Every teacher prepares the monthly teaching plan covering the various units of the syllabus prescribed by the university.

At the beginning of the session Orientation programme for the fresh students are organized by the college which is addressed by the Principal and followed by the teaching staff and the librarian. The office staff is also introduced to the new students. The history and the rules and regulations of the college is explained to the new students. The yearlong academic, cultural and extra curricular activities are show cased to them. The senior students are introduced to help them informally.

Extracurricular activities are conducted in the month of December and the cultural activities in the month of January.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

Crosscutting issues related to the Professional Ethics, Gender sensitization, Human values and human rights, Environmental issues and the sustainable development are integrated into the curriculum and transmitted to the students in systematic manner. While teaching those values teachers take into account the social and economic background and the world view of the students.

1. Gender.

The girls in the college are welcomed in the beginning of the session. Since most of them are the first generation college attendess in their family they are appreciated and congratulated and inspired to do well and be the change for the future generations. Educated mother is the main educator of the family. The various laws and measures to protect the women and develop them is explained which includes sexual harassment ,and family laws relating to the dowry and mental torture,the role of the family court,maintenance law in case of divorce etc. The boys and girls are taught how to interact with each other in healthy way respecting each others' dignity. The strict laws regarding the punishment is explained though the case studies picked up from the daily newspapers. International women's day is celebrated and its importance is explained through the different women political leaders of the world.

The college has good greenery inside the fore walls of the classrooms. The continual efforts of the teachers and the students have borne fruit literally. The fruit trees include guava, banana and mangoes. The college also does the tree plantation drive in the vicinity. The cleanliness drive is carried out at the foothills of the temple. The campus is kept plastic litter free. The use of synthetic stuff is discouraged because it takes long time to degrade. The concept of biodegradability is taught to the students. On the environment day quiz and lectures are arranged to create the awareness about the climate change. The cleanliness drive is done in the campus ponds. The trees have been planted in the enclosed tree area through the help of the department

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of the forest.

3. Human Values and Professional Ethics

The human rights day is observed and the value of liberty and the right to peaceful existence with concern for the life and liberty of others is inculcated amongst the students and the staff. The value of economic freedom to ensure the basic human values is essential prerequisite. The students are shown the value of handicrafts in becoming economically self sufficient. They are exposed to the weaving industry. The students are asked to get the eye check done at the nearby Primary Health Centre at the nominal charges. The worm pills are distributed free to all.

Response; Our college is situated between two big Government Colleges within a linear distance of 14 kms. It is a single faculty college. The students admitted in our college come from socially and economically weaker sections of the society. About 99 per cent of the students are from weaker sections of the society. They complete their study by taking scholarships from the government. Those students who fail to secure admission in the adjoining college take admission in our college. Thus the overwhelming majority of the students are of low educational levels.

Our institution identifies the slow learners and advanced learners under 3 parameters over a year.

Mechanism:

- 1.On the basis of the last year's marks.
- 2. The performance in the tests and activities are conducted at the beginning of the academic year.
- 3. Lastly, on the basis of the performance through out the year.

Strategies for advanced Learners.

- Students are encouraged to get the university ranks and are guided how to solve the paper in time.
- Students are given guidance to excel in the competitive /entrance exam.
- Career counselling is also done.
- Students are encouraged to become a team leader which develops the team spirit, responsibility and leadership.
- Our institution focuses on grooming the overall personality of the students and renders help to the bright students to get higher education.
- Participative learning sessions, i.e. Welcome Day, Teachers Day, Farewel Party, Yoga Day, Republic Day and Independence Day are organized.
- Students are motivated and opportunities are provided to them to gain experience through Educational tours, field visits etc.

Strategies for the slow learners.

Mentor – Mentee Interaction;

The respective Mentors have one to one interaction with their mentees and understand the progress in academic growth, sports, cultural activities, regularity and active participation in co curricular activities. The mentor also counsels on the health as well as stress issues relating to friends /parents/teachers.

Though the educational level is very low ,our college is renowned for continuous teaching and learning schedule. Every effort is made to make it student -centric. 'Lecture- method' is the predominant method

followed in all the programmes. The key mehtodololgies used are lecture method. interactive method or participatoy approach and problem solving method.

From the very beginning of the session, the students are strictly directed to attend the classes regularly. The lectures in the class is followed by the interaction with the students which helps the teachers to analyze their potential and also to plan further teaching schedule. The students are given home assignments based on the topics discussed. They are provided study material and books to enhance their knowledge. Apart from this, tutorials are organized for the benefit of the slow learners; the doubts of the students are cleared in these classes too.

Experiential Learning;

- The students take active part in organizing various extra and co curricular activities which helps them in developing their organizational and managerial skills . the best example is the Annual Function and prize distribution ceremony of the college.
- Educational tours and field visits are organized to enhance the exposure and experiential learning of the students.

Response; The college follows the academic calendar given by the affiliating university (Hemchand Yadav Vishwavidyalaya, Durg)

There is standard process of internal examinations in the college. According to the academic calender a student has to appear in four unit tests and two terminal examinations and one pre final examinations.

The schedule of the internal examinations is decided in the beginning of the session in the form of academic calender. According to the academic calender, a teacher has to take the unit test which may be in the form of written tests, black board presentation, quiz or any other method which the subject teacher decides.

The marks of the unit tests are shown in the classrooms and students can ask about their performance. the record of obtained marks is maintained. In case of doubt or discrepancies in their test copies, it is immediately resolved. The marks of half yearly exam is sent to the university for inclusion in the final annual result. This is confidential so its not shown to the students. The 10 per cent of the total marks in a paper is through the half yearly exams.

Similarly the black board presentation is done in the classroom so that all students can participate and can see each other's performance. This method helps students in their personality development too.

- The schedule of the internal examination is displayed on the notice board.
- The signature of the students are taken at the time of internal examinations.
- The students are provided with the answer sheets by the relevant subject teachers. The doubts and queries of the students are clarified by the examiner.
- Transparency in the internal examination is maintained and the grievances of the students are resolved if any.

The Ramatola college area is 16.49 acres. There are good number of trees in the campus and around the campus. The built up area of the college is 1175 sqrare metres. It has 17 rooms in total. Of which one room is the Principal's chamber. There is one staff room. There is one library in which students get the syllabus related books as well as other knowledge based books. There is one computer room for the students to do the self on hand training from time to time by the intrested students. For classroom teaching and learning there are three big class rooms. B.A. Part-1, B.A Part-2 and B.A. Part-3 classes are conducted. There is another similar classroom which is used as for assembly purpose, organising the events, meetings and inhouse seminar. One room has been earmarked as Yoga room for the students and the staff. One room is for gymnasium. Equipments are occasionally used by the sudents and the staff. One girl's common room is used by the girls in their leisure time. It has attached toilet which is used by the girls and the ladies staff as well..NSS unit isn't functionalso in the same room Youth Red Cross is conducted. First Aid box and bandage is kept which is used in the times of emergency. There is small kitchenette which is used for making tea regularly and food occasionally. Girls have separate washrooms as a common facility and also another washroom attached to the girl's common room. For boys common washroom facility is available which is also used by all other staff. Male staff has another washroom too which is infrequently used. One sports room is there which has Javelin, Discus, Shot put, Badminton etc. These are used for Annual Sports Day competition. There is one Music room which has Tabla, Dholak, Harmonium etc. These are used in the cultural festivals of the college from time to time. There is one office room where government documents are kept and office conducted. Attached to it is the strong room which is rather a store room.

In the courtyard of the college there is one badminton court for playing badminton on the soil and grass base. The courtyard has different types of flowers and fruit bearing plants .. The college has borewell for drawing water and storing in the up tank. For safe drinking water R.O. Kent system has been installed with water cooler for drinking. The college has its own playground which is not developed. The college campus has two ponds which was used to teach swimming techniques to the boys and girls. In the principal chamber there is one LED TV FOR the use by students and staff for news and government programmes. One Photo copy machine is there for the official purpose. Printer is there too with color and black n white print facility. There are five computers, six green boards.

There is good environment for the sports activities. Every year annual sports is conducted in which students enthusiastically participate. The following events like 100 meters. 200 meters, 400 meters race, High jump. Long jump, Shot put, Javelin throw, Discus throw, slow cycle, musical chair are held.

In indoor games Carrom, Table Tennis, Badminton, Chess tournaments are held. Some students represent college in district level completion. For all these competions sports goods are available in the college.

The sports department extends the following facilities to the students.

Academic related facilities

The computers in the college are used by the students and the staff and its maintenance is not well taken care of because of no trained personnel available.

Sports goods and library facilities and its maintenance.

The college has one library. There is no post of Librarian. One Book lifter is posted who takes care of the keeping books in serial order. The incharge librarian is an Assistant Professor who mainly looks after the issuing of books and general maintenance of library. The book lifter does mostly office work on computers.

There is no regular post of Sports Officer which is again managed by the Sports in charge Assistant Professor. Sports goods are managed and maintained by the in charge professor. Sports ground is there but not developed. Maintenance is done by the help of staff and the students.

The Public Works Department does the white/ color washing on requests. The repairing work is not done by them despite requests.

The college tries its level best to maintain the furniture. Every year regular and private students appear in the annual exam for which we have sufficient seating facilities. During the last 5 years the furniture worth Rs 94520 (Rs Ninety Four Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Only) has been purchased. There have been no expenses on the repairing work.

College ...facilities maintenance process

Our college maintenance work is done from time to time, in which Library, sports complex.,computer,class etc requires small reparing of fan ,lights and protection from termites.

Swachhta programmes

The college has class four staff who cleans the Principal chamber, class room, staff room, computer room, library regularly. The students are also encouraged to clean the class room by themselves too. The garden is cleaned and watered regularly. The sweeper cleans the washrooms daily. The staff and the students are regularly instructed to flush after use. For that purpose bucket of water is kept inside the bathroom. The tap water also runs.

The small garbage do not get littered around; one waste bin is there for the students to dump the garbage in. The water purifier is maintained.

ADMINISTRATIVE PARTICIPATION.

Student union election is held every year through direct election or through the merit system as per rules as decided by the Government of Chhattisgarh from time to time. The President, Vice President, Secretary and Joint Secretary is either directly elected as per government ordnance or nominated based on the merit as per government directives. Student Union list of all the five years from the year 2016-17 to 2020-2021 is enclosed. Student Union in -charge is senior most teacher appointed by the Principal of the institution.

There is one Anti Ragging Committee in the college which is under the charge of the teacher. The student union members and the class representative can participate in the proceedings of the meeting. The legal aspects of the ragging is intimated to them. Since our college is located in the rural region hardly any student engages in ragging. In fact they are not even aware of it unless explained. It is a moral dilemma to teach them something negative which they would not ever be aware of.

The college has other committees like Voter Awareness, Sweep, Women Upliftment Programme in which students carry out their duties and responsibilities. The cleanliness drive is carried out by the office bearers of the student union and the class representatives. For Voter Awareness (SVEEP) campaign the Campus Ambassador is appointed who has attained the age of 18 years and has his name included in the voter list. Through the rally the villagers are made aware through posters and banners, and inspired to cast their votes in free and fair manner and choose the representative. On this occasion Rangoli, Painting competition is organized by the college.

Students participate and cooperate in the cultural activities of the college. They also show their cooperation and participation in sports activities. They participate and support the tree plantation actively. Every year students are taken out for the educational trip which fosters in them the team spirit and the organizational skill. They also learn the leadership skills.

Library Committee.

Our college does not have the sanctioned post of a librarian. Due to this one designated Assistant Professor carries out the responsibility of the library. Though there is one post of the Book lifter whose work is largely confined to the office as a computer helper. The present library in charge is carrying out the responsibility for last six years. There are sufficient books available for all the students of the college. B.A. final year students are provided with the competitive books. the students and teachers are provided with separate table and chairs to study. Thus they take the benefits of the library.

The student union in-charge is entrusted to the senior most teacher of the college. The student union election is conducted as per the guidelines of the state government. The ordinance is adhered for election. As per the ordinance the President, Vice- President, Secretary, Joint Secretary are elected. All the three classes have the class representatives. The reservation rules for the scheduled caste and scheduled tribes and other backward classes are followed. The nomination is done on the basis of marks when the electoral election is not directed.

Examination Committee

The college conducts the under graduate annual exam as per the scheduled time tables announced by the Hemchand Yadav University. The Center superintendent is assisted by the superintendant and Assistant superintendent. The invigilators do the exam room duty. The class three and four staffs help in the extension of facilities to the students.

Sports Committee

The college has a sports committee. There is no sanctioned post of sports teacher in our college. Therefore

one teacher is in charge of the sports activities. The annual sports event is conducted every year. The track and field events are held for boys and girls. Those who excel are encouraged to participate at the district level. The college ponds when full with water is used for giving students lesson in swimming. The courtyard has a make shift badminton court. It also has a chin up bar. The gymnasium has dumb bells and bar bells. The bench press can be used for weight lifting.

Improving the Infrastructure; The college authority makes an earnest effort to improve the requisites infrastructure of the college. It has proposed that some of the class rooms should be made ICT enabled smart class rooms. A good seminar hall is to be made. Greening the campus is already almost done. The construction of boundary wall is due and correspondence in all these matters is being pursued. Sufficient numbers of student chair and the desks have been made available. Raising of fund is a big question which is not forthcoming. The limited non government Janbhagidari fund is used for maintenance of bore wells and fencing the tress.

Corporate Social Responsibility; The college bears the moral responsibility to serve the area it is situated in. The youth red cross organizes the health and sanitation drive in the neighborhood. AIDS awareness and Voter awareness programme is done. Through the class, students and villagers are taught to be aware of various financial scams.

The Principal is the head of the institution who is appointed by the Department of Higher Education, Government of Chhattisgarh. The Principal is assisted by the Teaching and the Non teaching staff. The different committees have been formed to carry out the different tasks and duties. The Principal has to follow the orders of Commissioners of Higher Education, Govt of Chhattisgarh, Hemchand Yadav University Durg, MHRD,UGC, and the District Magistrate of the District. The different committees are Admission Committee, Anti ragging Committee, Purchase committee, Internal Exam Committee, Sports Committees, Cultural Committee. NAAC incharge, UGC incharge and various other committees from time to time as per the exigencies.

The service rules are governed by the general government rules followed by the Chhattisgarh Government employees. The promotion rules of non teaching staff is the same. However in matters of teaching employees it hangs between the state rules and UGC.

The complaints by the students and the staff is handled by the Grievance Redressal Cell. Students can file online complaints too.

The administrative set up is decided by the government. The salary of the college staff is disbursed through the Treasury of the Government of Chhattisgarh. The pension is applicable to the employees who joined before 01 January 2004. Rest comes under New Pension System. The service rules are the same as applicable to the State Govt. employees.

Our college follows the fixed pattern of the appraisal system as laid down by the State Government; the annual confidential report is signed by the Principal for all the teaching and non teaching staff. This report is sent to the Higher Education Department for review or affirmation. The report is taken into consideration for the promotion if the government ever decides to promote. For the teachers its 2 page proforma ;one part filled by the teacher and another part is for comments from the Principal. For the non teaching staff it is just one page proforma. For teachers PABS system has been introduced as an appendage to the confidential report.

The Performance Based Appraisal System is the assessment of the teachers' academic achievement and proficiency. The format contains four main parts. Part-A: general instructions, Part-B: Academic performance, Part-C: other related informations, and Part-D: Comment on the self-assessment by the Higher-Education Department of Chhattisgarh Government.

The main part, i.e., Part-B consists of 4 categories. Category-I includes "Teaching-learning and evaluation related activities of total 125 marks. Category-II includes "Co-curricular, extra- curricular and professional development related activities of total 50 marks. Category-III includes "Research and academic contribution" having no boundary of marks. Category-IV includes "Summary of the API" to be filled by the teaching faculty.

RESPONSE;

Ramatola college espouses the causes of gender equity and make the staff and students aware about the issues related to gender parity in all spheres of life. The special problems faced by the women in our society due to the traditional cultural practices are explained how it has become redundant in modern lifestyle. It's imperative that the important section of the society is brought to the same level as others for the proper development of the individual, family and the nation.

Women centered programmes and events are not exclusively organized but girls are made the equal participant in the all the activities of the college. Whenever any activity like drawing ,painting , playing games like badminton, table tennis or athletics are organized; the girls are simultaneously asked to participate without any noticeable gender discriminations. Our aim is to instill equality through practice. Even in the class we encourage students for mixed sitting which is not strictly enforced though. The strict laws relating to violence against women are told to everyone so that it acts as deterrent for any mischief. The recent POSCO act is explained to protect the girl child from any physical or online abuse. The issues are discussed in the common groups in a manner that brings harmony and non antagonistic feelings against the opposite sexes. For the privacy of the female students separate girls common room and the washrooms facilities are there. The Internal Complaints Committee against sexual harassment and Anti ragging Committee takes care of any untoward situations from arising. 30 per cent of all reserved seats go to the girl candidates. In all, girls meet the lady teacher who explains them about the dangers and preventions of cervical cancer and the breast cancer.

Solid Waste Mangement

The solid waste generated is very few. The bio degradable waste is left in the pit for decomposition. The dry woods are burnt during the winter nights by the chowkidar to keep warm and the ashes are used for the plants fertilization All the use of plastic is banned in the premises. Waste bin are used to collect the wastes

Liquid Waste Management

The liquid used by the college goes into the soak pit. No overflows water goes waste. It sinks into the ground. Even water body collection is not visible on the ground surface. So there is no breeding of mosquitoes either.

Rain Water Harvesting

The college has well designed system of roof top rain water harvesting.

Rainwater through the pipes are drained to the rain water harvesting pit which is filled up with the gravel, sand and bricks. This brick structure is built on the backside of the college.

Biomedical waste management

In our college no such wastes are generated because we have only Arts Faculty therefore no laboratory of any kind.

E-Waste Management

There is hardly any e-waste generated here. The kaput hard disk has never been disposed off. Rather it's given for repairing.

Measures for the socially and educationally weaker section of the society:

Our college ensures that the seats reserved for the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes are allotted to them. Since the area is predominantly inhabited by the above sections of the society so almost all the seats are filled up by them only. Mentor-Mentee meetings are held to ensure the communication channels for the problem sharing and solutions remain open.

The college provides scholarships to the needy students through the government programmes. The economic disparity is minimized through scholarship and free books besides good interpersonal interactions. The tolerance for the other religions are taught and inbuilt social biases are cleared through rational thinking. At the language level our college is in Chhattisgarh so the local dialect is Chhattisgarhi. This sweet language is well understood by a Hindi speaker. So conflict does not exist. However due to low English learning we have to encourage them to learn English as it's the international language without going into the emotional issues. Only the peaceful mind and harmonious society is conducive to the culturally rich society which Chhattisgarh is proud of.

The practice

Well, the quality of the students in our institute doesn't match up well with the All India Higher Education Objectives, but they are curious and mature enough to see and understand things related to their immediate environment. The most of the syllabus is alien to their environment and at times counterproductive to their positive learning and growth like chapters on communalism, anti ragging ,dowry etc.

So we have to adapt and teach them that those things happen in the other parts of our country but not in our region. We are peace loving people with good cultural traditions of peace, harmony, dance and music.

The countryside students learn the positive values and imbibe them literally like honesty, loyalty and are easily swindled by urban scamsters who dupe villagers in the name of profit and employment. It's really hard to teach them how to identify the fraudsters. But the few students do understand and hopefully they will be the future leaders of the rural folks who will act as the catalyst of change to bring about the desired awareness and change.

The self centeredness of the students prevents them from organising themselves on higher objectives of making an awareness group for mass social campaign against social evils like drinking, gambling, idling etc.

The poverty level of the students constricts their consciousness to think beyond the survival needs. Another hurdle in their college education is that it doesn't lead to any employment. First their academic achievement is quite low for any competitive exam. Secondly there is hardly any employment except at the teaching levels at schools.

Most of the organized government jobs at lower level in Army, Railway, banks has 12th pass as the minimum educational requirements. So the university education is just a time pass or getting a degree at best. The seriousness towards the academic learning is seriously missing. There is not much writing about the lack of interests amongst the students about higher education. No systematic study or the research is being done. Here we are taking the personal responsibility in not contributing to the writing. Well one may have the valid reasons but result is what matters and not the excuses. Hope to achieve it before the next cycle of NAAC accreditation. This NAAC process has set the mind thinking and pushing towards the activities.

Another constraint is the teachers coming into the profession are not able to transcend their boundaries of their social ties and biases. Newer and higher values are alien to them and very hard for them to adapt. Higher education is about higher ideas and values not just learning the letters. Teachers need to migrate to new places of learning which is mostly the administrative and the policy matter of the government.

7.2 EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

The awareness campaign shows much interests and enthusiasm but it's intensity is not sustained in the

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long run. Participation goes down. Group disintegrates because of the lack of continuous support it just withers. The long term evidence of success is almost completely lost once the student passes out. Those motivated to achieve better and higher in life settle down into marriage mostly girls and discontinue their study. The boys take up the traditional farming of the farm labour job or as a vendor or a lorry driver.

Some of them break down psychologically trying to meet the higher goals. They need counselors and psychiatrists which is hard to come by. Even they are not ready to get themselves treated or counseled. They succumb to the age old solution of getting them married.

However the success is achieved in terms of exposure which would help them motivate their next generation children and achieve better than themselves.

These students don't have the success model from their own surroundings to motivate them. Failures around breed failures in the mind. Success around breeds success in their minds. Few of the successful students have to be idolized and presented as an ideal or role model from amongst them like LIC district head.

. PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

The students lose the interests because of the lack of sustained activities and their inability to attend regularly. They are attracted in the first place but gradually fail to internalize it as it's for their own betterment. The thing which comes very easily to them is valued the least; it follows the most common psychological laws of human beings.

The financial crunch on the part of the institute and the students play a big role. For the boys and the girls the willingness to go on excursion is thwarted by their inability to meet the travel cost. There is no institutional mechanism to meet that. Participative money has limitations due to the extreme poverty in countryside. Printing of handbills, buying of trekking equipments to evince the student's interests, organizing field trips often isn't there. Sponsorships of these activities in the rural backward college are impossible.

The other institutions around our institutions can reach out to us and take up the expertise and bring their students to us for the participation along with the finanancial resources. They will benefit our leadership, expertise, guidance and for financial help to our students.

Student exchanges or add- ons is desirable. Rich colleges should open the activity gates for students from rural and resource starved colleges like ours. The policy has to be framed by higher authorities to facilitate this at intra district level and inter district level.

CONTEXTS

Since the college is situated in the vicinity of hills, forests, ponds, and farmlands it's imperative that we take the physical and social environment into account before formulating a need and resource based best practice.

The rural poor children need to assess and train themselves as per their social and economic environment.

Fun filled learning has to be complemented with swimming lessons in the ponds are the entire package that is offered to the students.

The semi literate family of almost all our students require the family counseling at their respective houses to instill in them sense of commitment. It also helps in understanding the social and the family milleu in which their mindset is formed and impediments in implementing new ideas or actions. Their ability to perceive the future and the readiness to accept or resist.

We take pride in knowing each of the students personally and know their academic level and their temperament. This helps in mentoring them at the individual level. Since they are from the neighboring villages a visit to their homes lays the foundation of deeper life long relationship. The warmth and the mutual trust helps in lifelong mentoring. The result of the learning becomes evident in the students adult life.

During the cultural activities it's the participation of almost all the students. This gives the opportunities to every student to groom themselves. Even in sports each one strives to lean the events even though the accomplishment in terms of achievement amount to nothing. We believe we are preparing them to be the good parents who will care for their future generations in much better informed way. Most of them are the first generation learners. None of their parents ever entered the college life so the expectations of parents

remain high. We teach them that how immediately after 12 th exam what are prospective job opportunities. This they should pass it on in their family, friends, relatives and in the neighborhood. Most of them have the non science background prior to joining the B.A. They are made to realize the importance of science learning and the value of scientific thinking. Doing graduation is not just knowing the letters but understanding what constitutes knowledge. Our endeavour is to teach them the value of analysis of the problem and the possible solutions to it. We teach to look at the issues and events dispassionately to arrive at the truth.

Being ensconced in the natural surroundings of forest, hills and ponds we encourage them to explore the surroundings and learn the ways to gainfully benefit from it maintaining its pristineness and the ecosystem. We take them around hills and forest and teach them the value of maintaining its beauty, develop the aesthetic sense, how not to litter the natural place with plastic and bottles. The wild animals and reptiles and their behavior is explained; the education is geared to understand the immediate environment and how well to preserve it. Many a times people do not realize the value of what they have unless they are told and made conscious of it.

We focus on the intrinsic values of education more because our students have highly limited scope of gainful employment in the organized sector. Therefore the focus on them is to make them gainfully self employed and be a productive labourer. We encourage them how to rise from the labour to entrepreneur level. Some have succeeded too.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information:

Our college has been on the verge of getting closed down. Once the final order of closing it had come but later the government rescinded it; much later on the second attempt to close down the college could not materialise then they closed the Commerce faculty. due to lack of student support and the nearness to the big colleges in vicinity its development is thwarted.

Concluding Remarks:

Since the college has to go on. Therefore the NAAC accreditation process has been set in by the government. On its own it would have been the last college to get the NAAC accreditation done. Hopefully after the accreditation the college will function well with new funds and initiatives to bring it at par with the neighbouring colleges..
